



## Mid Year Edition 2022-23

It's a true pleasure to be a servant leader in the Clinton Community School District. We are blessed to have wonderful students, outstanding educators, a devoted Board of Education, and a community that emanates Cougar Pride. The devotion and pride in our educational system is front and center as constituents and visitors alike express their amazement in the renovations and additions that have taken place at both of our buildings.

A huge thank you goes out to the constituents of the district as the passage of the bond referendum back in 2020 paved the way for CCSD to streamline operations as we shifted from three school buildings to two. Last year, we shifted grades 7 and 8 to join grades 9-12 at what is now referred to as Clinton Junior/Senior High School. The old high school, once a middle school, transformed into Clinton Elementary School serving grades 4K-6, and the old elementary school was torn down with the land sold.

Construction is wrapping up at the elementary school where additions and renovations have drastically improved the educational environment for our students. The additions, renovations and capital improvements at both Clinton Elementary and the Junior/Senior High School were on schedule and under budget. With historic low interest rates, taxpayers will be saving over \$14 million dollars in interest costs over what was projected. These low rates have also shortened the repayment time on the loans by six years.

Achieving educational excellence, and exercising responsible financial stewardship, is a priority. I'm extremely proud to have overseen a budget operating in the black for the past six years. The vast majority of the budgetary savings has been placed into Fund 46 which is geared towards capital improvements to ensure that our buildings and grounds get the priority needed to remain viable for generations to come. As a District, we have worked vigorously to be as fiscally prudent as possible, while continuing to provide an enriching educational experience for our students.

District residents know – and numerous studies demonstrate – that quality public schools have a positive impact on local communities. It's apparent that strong schools equal strong communities. Thank you for your continued support, and Go Cougars!

# CCSD Redefining Ready Scorecard

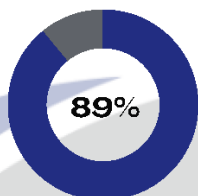

Attendance is more predictive of academic success than standardized test scores.



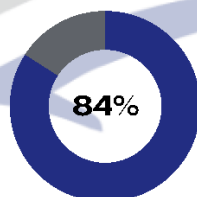
## Service Learning

25+ hours of service learning enhances college graduation rates by 22%.



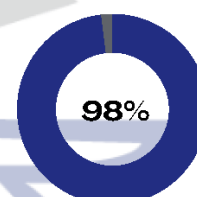
## Engaged in 2 or More Co-Curriculars

Co-curricular participation promotes achievement, attitudes and habits that help lead to college and career success.



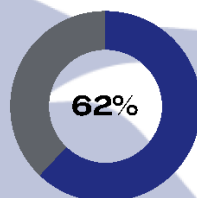
## Dual Credit

HS students who have earned college credit are significantly more likely to persist and earn higher GPA's in college.



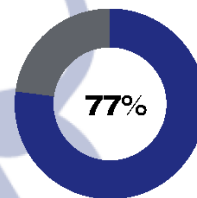
## GPA of 2.8 or Higher

HS GPA is the strongest predictor of college success and students meeting this indicator have a higher likelihood of reaching the middle class.



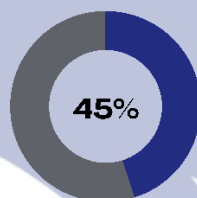
## Earning a C or Higher in Algebra II

Success in Algebra II is necessary to enter a registered trade apprenticeship and linked to college enrollment and degree attainment.



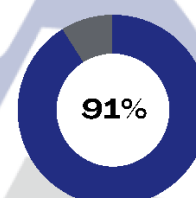
## Work Based Learning & Industry Recognized Credentials

WBL and IRC allows students to apply academic lessons outside of the classroom while building employability skills and gaining valuable experiences.

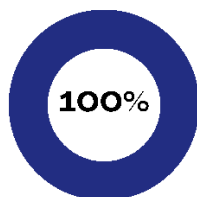


## Enrollment in Career Pathway Sequence

Completing two or more courses within a career pathway allows students to take advantage of career exploration and further develop a career path.

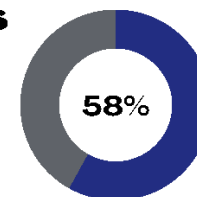


## Percent of Students Meeting Indicators

## **Clinton Junior Senior High School Principal, Mrs. Erika Stewart**

What a great start to the 2022-2023 school year! After two years of struggling through a pandemic, and then a full year of “back to normal,” this year brings a renewed sense of school routines, community, and spirit. The impact that COVID-19 had on educational institutions was magnified last school year as we transitioned back to full-time year-long instruction. Staff and students struggled with routines, motivation, and engagement. This caused us to focus on establishing a community of high expectations and accountability. Finally, we are seeing the motivation and desire to learn, accountability, and responsibility in our students; and it feels great!

Our building improvements are finally complete and the school has been buzzing with activities. We have held wrestling duels with multiple schools in attendance, and hosted many academic conference events such as math meets, RVC band, and the RVC student council meeting, this spring we will host our “CJSH Reality Check” for juniors and seniors, and we have opened our facilities to community events such as youth basketball. Guests visiting our building often comment on how nice our facilities are. Thank you to the community for your support in passing our referendum because, without you, these facilities would not be possible.

Being in year two as a junior senior high school, many of the changes that we made last year are proving to make a difference in our culture. Our extracurricular groups such as the student council, FFA, and DECA have included all students in seventh through twelfth grade in their activities. Student Council just hosted our winter pep assembly where students in all grade levels competed in school spirit activities to earn spirit points. Seventh and eighth graders enjoyed being part of the sing-along, musical chairs, and the always exciting sleigh rides. We even streamed the assembly so that anyone that wanted to could watch and join in on the fun. Activities like these bring out the best in our students and work to build our Cougar culture.



Being involved in extracurricular activities while in high school greatly increases the student's sense of belonging and helps to encourage involvement in clubs and groups after high school. DECA welcomes all seventh through twelfth grade students and was recently recognized by the National Charter for membership growth this year. CJSH was one of only twenty schools in Wisconsin to be recognized for DECA membership growth. Recently, members from our local DECA chapter attended their first district competition of the year where twelve of our high school students competed in different entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality, and management competitions. Our students did great and brought home three DECA medals. These students are serving as awesome role models for the younger DECA members.

Work-Based Learning is one of the most popular programs at Clinton Junior Senior High School. This year, students have been busy exploring their career interests through various field trip opportunities. Mrs. Paynter organizes two to three field trips each month to help students narrow down which career pathway best fits their interests. Field trips have included UW-Platteville Construction Career Fair, Wisconsin Business World at Hendricks CareerTek, Blue Collar Rods & Rides, JM Aarud Mechanical Piping, All-Tech Auto Service, Blackhawk Technical College (BTC) Manufacturing Day, BTC Health Science, BTC Fire Science, BTC Auto & Diesel, and the Wisconsin Education Fair. We encourage students to participate in a variety of career exploration activities so that they can be best prepared for whichever path they choose to take after high school.

## **Director of Academics and Innovation, Mrs. Janae Gile**

What an exciting year we've had at CCSD so far! We completed a huge clean up of classroom and curricular resources and were able to purchase much needed updated curriculums, textbooks, resources and professional development, and coaching for the school year. None of these endeavors would have been possible without community support through the referendum and ESSER funding, so Thank You!

### **Curriculum**

After researching, exploring, and meeting with multiple reps for an entire year, large curricular purchases were made for Clinton Elementary School as well as Clinton Junior Senior High School. All decisions were made with staff input and intended to positively impact student achievement and engagement in the classroom while using research based instructional materials and strategies. At Clinton Elementary School, evidence based programming related to English Language Arts, 4K full day programming, and Social Studies were areas of focus. Amplify Core Knowledge Language Arts (CKLA) is a top rated program that is grounded in the Science of Reading and combines content knowledge in history, science, literature, and the arts with research-based foundational skills instruction. Into Social Studies inspires curiosity and cultivates analytical skills in students through hands-on lessons and activities. Both programs have online and print materials for students to access. Last but not least, math was another large focus area. Not only did we increase our Math Interventionist position to full time, but we also purchased a school wide intervention program called Bridges. The materials

and resources are organized by content, not grade level, so that classroom teachers can meet their individual student needs. In addition, math manipulatives and vertical writing surfaces were purchased to encourage student engagement with the learning of math.

For Clinton Junior Senior High, a major focus was on textbooks and updated resources within classrooms. New textbooks were ordered for Social Studies, Science, and Family Consumer Science. Additional resources and on-line supports were purchased to support a variety of academic and elective areas such as new materials for use within Physical Education classes, online materials for Career and Technical Education departments, and musical instruments for the Band program.



### **Professional Development & Coaching**

Not only was CCSD able to get updated resources into staff and students hands, but we were also able to create multiple opportunities for trainings and coaching regarding instructional practices and maximizing student achievement. We've created a yearly plan that includes on-going sessions and learning related to culturally responsive practices, literacy instruction, and high-engagement math instruction. We are also infusing literacy and math coaching for staff in between the learning sessions. As we continue to focus on meeting individual staff needs and interest areas, we've had select staff members engage in training regarding Advanced Placement course instruction, best practices in regards to grading and reporting practices and classroom management, and structures to positively impact student learning.

Staff have embraced the programming updates and believe that the rigor, high interest topics, and specific skill and knowledge instruction will positively impact our students and their achievement. That, coupled with the tools and additional strategies they are learning and practicing, serve to reinforce our continuous improvement focus of increasing instructional levels and academic achievement.

Things are all abuzz in the Pupil Services Department here at Clinton Community School District! Everyone is working together like busy bees in order to ensure best practices are in place throughout the district in each of our departments. Our kids DESERVE it, and we will settle for nothing less!

In our English Learners (EL) Program, we have begun multiple initiatives to increase our student outcomes and are partnering with our friends at CESA 2 to help guide us in this work. Already this year we have: initiated a celebration for Hispanic Heritage Month, provided professional development to our general education staff on best practices in EL, furnished a full day of training for all EL teachers on best practices, and initiated countless other improvement measures. In fact, so much work has been done to increase student achievement in our EL program that CESA 2 has chosen to showcase our work at the next CESA 2 EL networking event. Now that is exciting!

Within our Nursing program, we are seeking Project Adam/Heart Safe Schools accreditation. Project Adam is a nationwide initiative that seeks to raise awareness about sudden cardiac arrest (SCA), create a safety net to prepare bystanders to respond with confidence in an incident of SCA, and serve as a resource in the establishment of cardiac emergency action plans within schools to create more Heart Safe spaces. Our nursing staff is also working to gain Stop the Bleed accreditation. Stop the Bleed is an initiative to raise

awareness and teach people how to complete three quick actions to control serious bleeding. By implementing both of these initiatives, we are creating a safer school environment for our students, staff, and community!

School Counseling staff are diligently working to incorporate the new American School Counselor Association's (ASCA) Student Standards: Mindsets & Behaviors for Student Success K-12 College, Career, and Life-Readiness Standards for Every Student into the core of our instruction. This is an intense process, and we intend to have it completed by the end of the 2022-2023 school year. Implementing these new standards will ensure we are providing students with all the knowledge they need to become both academically and personally successful.

In Special Education, we are making it a point to bring the focus in on student strengths and interests. Identifying and capitalizing on a student's strengths and interests is a great way to boost student engagement and confidence and, in turn, achievement. In addition, we are seeking to partner even more with parents to determine how we can work together to help their child meet their Individualized Education Program (IEP) goals. Working together to support students helps propel student growth!

In our Talented and Gifted Program, we are reading *Gifted Program Evaluation: A Handbook for Administrators and Coordinators* by Kristie Speirs Neumeister, Ph. D, and Virginia Hays Burney, Ph. D. This text is guiding our work as we seek to complete an internal assessment of our practices. This process will help us to identify the things we should continue doing that are working well and the areas in which we need to improve our practices. We are very excited to learn throughout this process as we work to increase student achievement for all learners.

Our Alternative Education program is prioritizing student attendance. We know that attendance is directly linked to student achievement. With that in mind, we are leaving no stone left unturned to ensure our kids are in school and learning each and every day. Our team is very passionate about this work and is relentless in their drive to help all students succeed!

Overall, the staff in the Pupil Services Department is as busy as ever making sure we are going above and beyond to meet the needs of each and every learner. We will continue to work hard and are committed to academic and personal excellence for all students!

Over the last four months, we have put an emphasis on improving the support experience for our staff and students. One of our initiatives has been the implementation of a new IT Service Desk. This new platform, built with school districts in mind, has introduced a new service delivery model that has helped streamline requests and provide the I.T. staff with a more organized and intuitive workflow on the back-end.

In conjunction with that, the I.T. team has set up a support line that staff can call to get immediate assistance for time-sensitive needs. These implementations have been well-received and we are working every day to continually improve in this area.

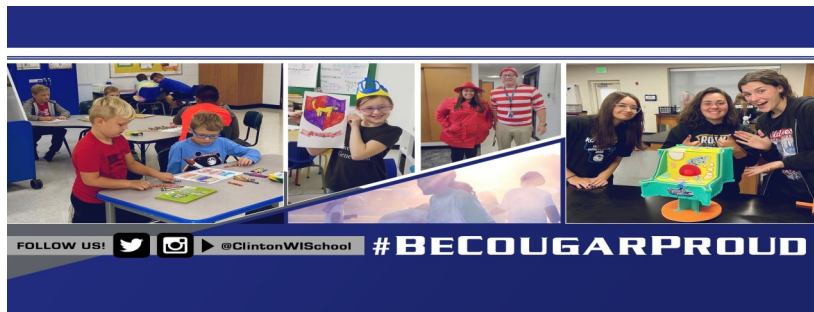

We are continuing to look for ways that will help our staff get the resources that they need faster and in a more organized manner. We have set up centrally-managed staff bookmarks that contain links to important resources and key district information. We have improved our onboarding process - which includes a one-on-one orientation session with a member of our team and a welcome email with quick links and important information to help new staff navigate the technology environment here at Clinton. Looking ahead, we are beginning to evaluate the systems and infrastructure we have in place and compare that to industry best practices and standards.

I am very grateful for the opportunity to manage the I.T. department and technology for the district and our team looks forward to strengthening our security posture, innovating with new technologies, and improving the overall technology environment here at Clinton. I have included some tech tips below that will help you protect yourself against cyber threats.

**Tech Tips:** Practicing good email security hygiene is a necessity in the world we live in today. The I.T Department would like to encourage everyone with access to email or texting to be vigilant in the fight against phishing (email) & smishing (texting) attempts. Here are some things you can do to increase your chances of not falling victim to any scams or email phishing attacks:

- Clean out your email inbox and unsubscribe to unnecessary emails so phishing emails are easier to spot.
- If an email looks suspicious or out of place for any reason, call the person or company to confirm that they sent the email using a number that you trust before interacting with it.
- Never click any links from an email or text that you don't completely trust! Visit the website directly or gather more information before proceeding.
- Hover over a link in an email to ensure it is taking you to where it says it will.
- Look for misspelled words, grammatical errors, or writing style that is out of character with the sender's typical style.
- When in doubt, always be defensive and don't assume that any email is trustworthy!

We have completed about 95% of the Facilities Referendum improvements. The district's Facilities and Grounds Department is diligently working on several initiatives that will enhance the safety and cleanliness of the district's buildings and grounds as we prepare for the final push of the school year.

- Install new siding on the back metal building at CES

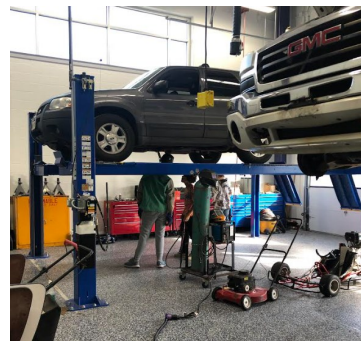

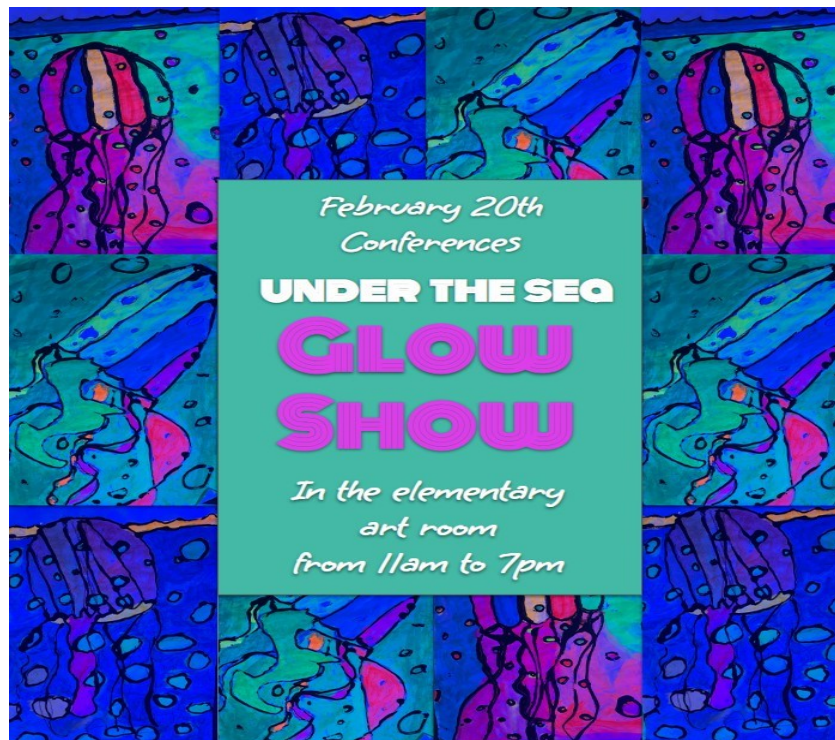
## **Clinton High School Auto Club**
