To all constituents, I want to thank you for your continued support of the Clinton Community School District. We are truly blessed to live in a community that values education and recognizes the need to provide students with the tools necessary to become college and career ready.

Achieving educational excellence and exercising responsible financial stewardship is a priority. I'm extremely proud to have overseen a budget operating in the black for the past seven years. The vast majority of the budgetary savings has been placed into Fund 46 which is geared towards capital improvements to ensure that our buildings and grounds get the priority needed to remain viable for generations to come. As a community, we were very fortunate to pass a bond referendum back in 2020, locking us into the historic low interest rates that existed at the time. Our taxpayers are saving millions of dollars in interest costs over what was projected and these low rates also have allowed us to shorten the repayment time on our loans by a number of years.

As a District, we have worked vigorously to be as fiscally prudent as possible, while continuing to provide an enriching educational experience for our students. At the annual meeting in October, the Board of Education decreased the levy by 1.5% which lowered the mill rate by 13.6%. The tax levy dropped for property owners from \$12.50 last year, to \$10.84 this year. To further enhance our financials, we're in our second year of operating as a two building district. The operational efficiency of having only two buildings, versus three, is paying dividends both financially and educationally. To top it off, we recently added solar panels to the Junior/Senior High School which is projected to give the district a lifetime energy savings of over \$200,000.

Academically we continue to make measurable gains in achievement as indicated by the recent State Accountability Report Card. CCSD meets expectations as identified by the Department of Public Instruction and for three consecutive years we have seen increased growth in Math and English Language Arts. CCSD prides itself on providing a well-rounded education where the state report card is just one measure of our commitment to students, families, and community. CCSD is committed to Redefining Ready, which values academics as well as experiences beyond the classroom such as work-based learning, service learning, and extracurricular involvement. The most recent Redefining Ready Scorecard indicates that 100% of our recent graduates were career ready, 96% of those graduates put in 25+ hours of service learning, and 76% of them engaged in two or more co-curricular activities. Those aforementioned indicators are not measured by the state report card but are considered highly valuable by our school community.

As solid as our academic and financial reports are, we are excelling with our staff culture and climate in the buildings. Responses from the 2023 Fall Staff Climate Survey indicated that 96.3% of respondents felt good about working in public education, 95.1% of our employees are happy at work, and 93.8% of staffers believe everyone is working toward the same goal of making a difference in the lives of students. One of the best quotes about how our staff feels came in the 2023-2024 teacher contract renewal survey when they were asked why they chose to stay at CCSD. This individual responded: *"CCSD feels like home. I love the people, students, and families I work with. I love seeing what CCSD is doing to make our district even better (new addition, new curriculums, etc.) while still keeping our core small town traditions at heart."*

We all have much to be proud of at Clinton Community School District and it's a true pleasure to be a servant leader of this outstanding district. Take care and Go Cougars!

Tax Levy Update

There was welcomed news for Clinton School District residents on December property tax bills this year.

In October the CCSD Board of Education approved a decrease of 1.5% in its levy for the 2023-24 tax levy cycle, and its mill rate dropped 13.6%. The tax levy rate on market (equalized) property values dropped for property owners in the Clinton School District from \$12.50 last year, to \$10.84 this year.

School levy tax credits also increased state-wide this year, so those credits further lowered tax amounts on December property tax bills. This led to many homeowners seeing decreases in the school tax line items of their bills this year.

Many factors contribute to the calculation of a school levy, but the school board has been engaged in multi-year planning and was positioned to decrease the mill rate over the next few years. That planning fast forwarded however, when the Department of Revenue released equalized property values increasing by an overall 13% for the seven municipalities that feed into the Clinton Community School District.

“We didn’t want the increase in property values to mean a large tax increase for our community. So the planning to slowly decrease the mill rate over the next few years changed. We took the decrease now to help taxpayers,” stated Board President Mike Birkholz. Mill rates are taxes for each \$1,000 of equalized property value. These rates decrease as property values rise and/or as new property growth occurs in a community when overall levies do not increase.

Because a school district is usually made up of several municipalities, how the municipalities interact with each other’s levies can also swing taxes in the end. This year, CCSD had one municipality that feeds into the district – City of Beloit – that only increased in equalized property value by 1%. The average increase for all municipalities was 13%, and when one municipality deviates significantly from others, the other municipalities do get a shift of more taxes than the average increase. “The Board did not want the residents in those municipalities to have to take on as much of the shift, so they made a conscious effort to reduce the levy,” stated District Administrator Dr. Jim Brewer.

Community Services – Still within the reduction of the tax levy noted above, CCSD was able to start a new program this year. One of the district’s goals this year is to increase community opportunities to encourage enrollment growth. Look for a community rec program through the school to be starting soon!

Open enrollment - spots are currently closed for KG – 4th grade in order to maintain class sizes at proper staffing levels. Spots are available in 4K!

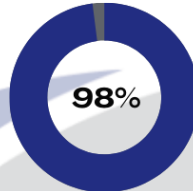

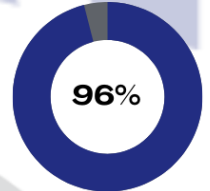
Attendance Rate

Attendance is more predictive of academic success than standardized test scores.



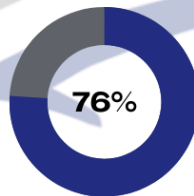
Service Learning

25+ hours of service learning enhances college graduation rates by 22%.



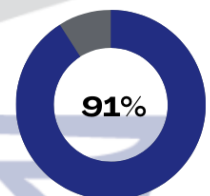
Engaged in 2 or More Co-Curriculars

Co-curricular participation promotes achievement, attitudes and habits that help lead to college and career success.



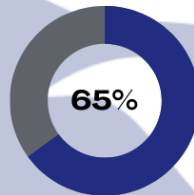
Dual Credit

HS students who have earned college credit are significantly more likely to persist and earn higher GPA's in college.



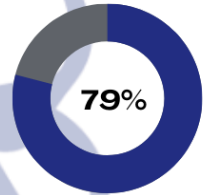
GPA of 2.8 or Higher

HS GPA is the strongest predictor of college success and students meeting this indicator have a higher likelihood of reaching the middle class.



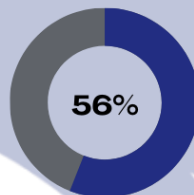
Earning a C or Higher in Algebra II

Success in Algebra II is necessary to enter a registered trade apprenticeship and linked to college enrollment and degree attainment.



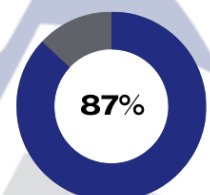
Work Based Learning & Industry Recognized Credentials

Completing two or more courses within a career pathway allows students to take advantage of career exploration and further develop a career path.

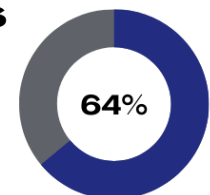


Percent of Students Meeting Indicators

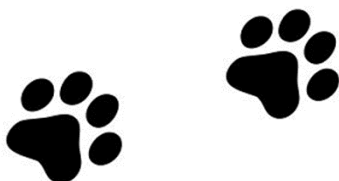

Hello Clinton Community!

I can't believe we are halfway through the school year! It feels like just yesterday that the IT team was spending its summer implementing a myriad of changes in advance of the new school year. Nonetheless, I'm happy to report today that the efforts the IT team undertook in the summer have paid off.

For instance, this school year at the Junior & Senior High School we switched to Google-based logins for all of our Windows lab computers. This means that students can now sign in to the lab computers with the same school-issued Google account they use to sign into a Chromebook. We've seen a dramatic decrease in lab-based IT help tickets since this has been implemented. In fact, staff also now use their school-issued Google account to sign into their Windows laptops and desktops. It has simplified the login process across the district.

We have also dramatically improved our security posture through the implementation of enterprise-grade endpoint detection and response software, decentralization of resources, and overall technology design and architecture. Since the start of the school year, we have begun a new security awareness training program for staff that includes email phishing training and required email security training. We are certainly making strides in the area of security and we will continue to research and adopt best practices in the security realm.

We're also making strides in the area of technology education for staff. We recently sent out our first edition of "What the Tech!" - a semi-annual I.T. newsletter complete with tech tips, helpful videos, and other technology-related information. It was well-received and we look to continue with the next edition this spring. Over the last several months, we have also doubled the amount of IT knowledge-based articles and have been able to provide these articles as the first step to ticket resolution for a good number of tickets.

While we're very happy with the things we've been able to accomplish over the last year, we're excited to finish out the school year strong and continue to improve the overall technology environment for the district!

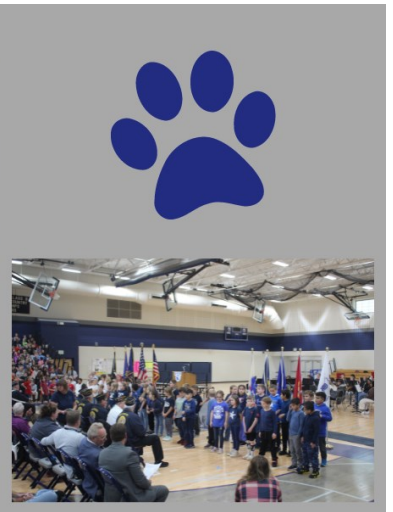
